

BOILERPLATE

Editor's Note: This little column will be repeated in each issue of Carefree Times pretty much as it is presented here. These are simply the basic issues of S.O.S. which are designed to increase the pleasure of the week-end for all stranders. They are repeated both for newcomers for information, and for old timers as a reminder.

- 1. S.O.S. Membership cards WILL NOT, REPEAT WILL NOT be replaced at the beach during an S.O.S. event for any reason. This includes lost cards, forgotten cards, stolen cards, concavity cards or whatever. No one at S.O.S. Headquarters is authorized by the Board to issue a replacement card. Please do not request anyone at Headquarters to do so.
- 2. There is a \$5.00 charge to replace lost cards by mail prior to S.O.S. events.
- 3. S.O.S. membership cards are not transferable.
- 4. There will be a \$15.00 charge for all returned checks.
- 5. S.O.S. cards must be visible, above the waist, at all times in participating S.O.S. clubs.
- 6. Glasses, cans, drinks, or bottles cannot be carried into any club. This is against S.C. law and will be enforced in all participating clubs.
- 7. Accepting membership in S.O.S. constitutes agreement to respect and comply with all ordinances of the City of North Myrtle Beach.
- 8. Official S.O.S. Membership Cards are sold only at S.O.S. Headquarters and the participating clubs. MEMBERSHIP CARDS ARE NEVER SOLD ON THE STREETS OR AT LOCAL PARTIES. Counterfeit cards will be confiscated and replacement cards will not be issued.
- 9. S.O.S. will pay a \$200.00 reward and lifetime membership to anyone who presents evidence which convicts a person or persons for selling counterfeit cards.
- 10. To receive S.O.S. discounts from participating merchants and restaurants, your S.O.S. card must be presented before you order.

Charlie and Jackie soar to second for the biggest win of their life in the U.S. Open Swing Dance Championship

Charlie Womble and Jackie McGee won second place in the Classic Division of the United States Open Swing Dance Championships at the Disneyland Hotel in Anaheim, California on November 29th. In a show-stopping performance that exploded the West Coast Swing Dancers to their feet for a standing ovation on several occasions, the perennial SPA champions elevated Shag to its highest place ever in national competition.


Competing before a crowd more accustomed to high heels and sequined gowns, or body hugging spandex, Charlie and Jackie achieved what many considered to be impossible. West Coast Swing Dancing is related to, yet oceans apart from shagging. Swing accents the female in a faster, sexier dance that features vertical moves, "hand dancing," lifts and throws, vigorous head movements swaying the hair,

and costumes. The dancers used ballroom space roughly equivalent to two first downs.

In West Coast Swing Dance competition, there are three primary divisions: Showcase, Classic, and Cabaret. Each division has structured rules governing required and prohibited steps, lifts, supports, and movements. In addition there are contest for Masters (Seniors) and Young Americans, (Juniors), and Jack and Jill (Mixed Doubles).

West Coast Swing Champions are studio oriented, closely tied to recognized teachers, and are dedicated professionals. They are great dancers, but they are not cool.

The event was a Jack Bridges Production. Jack, and his wife Mary Ann produce many championship events in the West and Mid-West. They are great at what they do, and the contest was better organized than any I have

experienced. Kenny Wetzel, DJ and Emcee, was recently honored by "Dance Action" magazine as the top DJ in the country.

While the production centered about the competition, there was over 16 hours of general dancing scheduled among the events. After each contest, the floors in the ballroom quickly filled with hundreds of couples with a wide variety of styles. Most were quite good at the dance, but at the end of each record, they quickly repaired to their tables.

The entire crowd of over 2000 was ably served by two small, hotel portable stand up

bars, each manned by a lone, somewhat bored, and far from overworked bartender. West coast Swingers are more interested in the contest than the party. This was no S.O.S.

Jackie and Charlie had the support of a group of shaggers from the Association and S.O.S. The promoters and dancers gave us a truly royal reception, were friendly, and interested in our dance and parties. We'll be seeing some of them at S.O.S.

And one other interesting thing—during the week-end, we had a small earthquake.

John will play only what he calls "blue gum blues" music, which is the original shag music. He refuses to play the "bubble gum" beach music or the country and western beach music, which meant that we heard some really good music that was different from most of the other clubs.


