BERNIE HARRIS REVISITED ... I was standing in Fat Harold's Jacksonville hospitality suite and noticed that a guy was kinda staring at me. "Didn't you work at Ocean Drive Beach back in the early 50's?" he asked. "I live in Jacksonville, but am originally from O.D. ... my Dad once ran the whiskey store there and owned all the juke boxes on the beach. I'm Bernie Harris." We chatted excitedly about the old days at O.D. and Bernie amazed me with his keen memory. "I remember you were the first guy I ever saw that wore Bermuda shorts. You and your buddy, Joe Keistler, would stroll through Robert's Pavilion at night wearing Bermudas, long socks, and coats and ties ... and the tourists would gawk and stare in disbelief. And this was before anyone had ever heard of Bermuda shorts in the Carolinas!"

A true story. Joe and I grew tired of tailored pegs, cleaned up our act, and had every pair of pants we owned cut off to the proper Bermuda length ... just above the knee cap (longer than worn now). This was in '53 and '54 and our dress attire was indeed considered daring in those days.

Once we decked out in our full regalia, including coats and ties, and attended a Louis Armstrong concert at Davidson College. I was dating Nadine, my wife now, and our reserved seats were all the way down front. We had to journey down the seemingly unending aisle as some 2,500 long pants lovers stood in unison and loudly jeered and hissed Joe and I for baring our sun-bronzed knees in public! Total nudity couldn't have evoked a more vocal response! Nadine still considers this to be her most embarrassing moment.

Ah, it was nice seeing Bernie Harris again after all these years. Beach people turn up in the damnest places!

Speaking of turning up, I was sitting at my favorite New Orleans haunt and bar, Le Booze, in April ... cooling it on a lazy Thursday afternoon ... listening to some old beach tunes on the juke box. Now Le Booze is a Bourbon Street "locals" bar. The clientele is mainly comprised of wonderful, colorful, eccentric French Quarter residents. Well, in walked S.O.S. members and good friends, Mike and Jean Brawley from Charlotte. It is indeed a small world!

Of Boxes, Beach People and Freedom ...

There are basic differences in people. And there are basic categoric similarities useful for placing various people types into their proper boxes.

Take "Poodle People," for example. They are similar in form, but quite different in concept from "Labador Retriever People." There are wide differences in style and behavior between these two distinct classifications. They are poles apart in approach.

How about car owners? Generally BMW owners are a different breed from Trans Am owners. There's nothing wrong with either. They are just different. They have different values ... different images.

The list goes on and on ...

It really doesn't matter from which beach you originally came ... O.D., Myrtle, Wrightsville, Jacksonville, Panama City, or wherever. You still belong in the "Beach People Box" and are cut from the same cloth ... you fit the same mold ... and share the same philosophies.

It's amazing to me that we were able to reach into the "Beach People Box" and pull out such a huge amount of these homogeneous types for an uninterrupted string of parties. They have really been sector gatherings. Reunions of a classification ... sub-order conventions, if you will!

There are so many obvious common denominators within the "Beach People" classification. The lifestye. Going for the gusto. The music, dancing and frolic. These are all just outward symbols. The real common glue, in my opinion, is the quest for personal freedom which can only be found by the side of the great mother, *The Ocean*.

Most of us rebelled and escaped to the beach as kids in this quest for freedom. We migrated to the beaches during the summers to free ourselves of parental pressures, of school pressures, and to be with those with like values... members of the same sub-order. This freedom was found at the beach in bountiful servings. Most of us matured quickly and were able to handle and enjoy this new-found freedom. It destroyed a few of our clan. Like in the 50's movie, "The Treasure of Sierra Madre," some just couldn't cope with their dream once it was actually in their grasp.

The rememberence of youthful freedom is also what has brought us back to the beach once again. We now wish to drink from the freedom cup once again ... to be free of the pressures of our professions, of aging and adult life.

This lifelong freedom-quest has engendered many friendships and bonds that are extremely strong and unwavering. There's graffiti on the wall of the Pad that sums this up. "I feel the brotherhood. What a feeling."

1952. Thirty four Years Ago ...

Lloyd Price cut his first record, "Lawdy Miss Clawdy," which roared and soared to first place on the R&B charts for the year. He was backed-up on piano by a New Orleans musician named Fats Domino.

The big three cities for R&B recording activity were Chicago, New Orleans ... and new-comer, Memphis.

Johnny Ace came on the scene and was an overnight success with his big hit and chart-buster, "My Song."

An oldie, swing-era jazz alto saxophonist hit the charts with "Flamingo." Earl Bostic had already paid heavy musical dues by '52. He had played in the bands of Lionel Hampton, Cab Calloway and Hot Lips Page. He had done arrangements for Louis Prima and Jack Teagarden. Earl Bostic was also a composer having writtten "Let Me Off Uptown" recorded by Gene Krupa. Bostic was one of the most accomplished and schooled musicians to ever record R&B tunes.

Johnny Ray, a white vocalist, scored on both the R&B and pop charts with "Cry."

WE GET LETTERS ...

"What has happened to the old Beach Music standards once played by the D.J.'s? A few years ago we could hear the music we remembered from the 50's and 60's at the beach. These were the tunes that brought us back together. The hits of the Tams, Drifters, Platters, Ravens, Clovers, Earl Bostic, Ruth Brown, Wynonie Harris, etc. Now many of the D.J.'s are pushing undiscovered, unheard of twangy, funky blues that few of us can even relate to. Beach music for S.O.S. is beach memories. It is the oldies, but goodies, tunes of yesteryears. D.J.'s don't need to show off their musical knowledge and record collections by playing obscure blues. Why don't the D.J.'s play more of the R&B hits that we remember and associate with O.D.?"

Editor's note: We're hearing this same tune (and complaint) in increasing numbers from lots of S.O.S. members lately. I really don't know how to respond to it. Maybe one of the D.J.'s can answer your question? How 'bout it, guys?

"The S.O.S. really needs to do something about all the non-members that come to our party each September. Let's get a headquarters where only S.O.S. members are allowed in. I love 'Fat Harold's,' but they at sometimes let in their own members to our daytime functions which creates problems. Now that Fat Harold's is 'public,' can't we lease the facility during the day? 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
